
THE EVENT

CONFERENCE PROGRAMME

ONLINE EDUCA BERLIN 2008 provided a unique opportunity to hear about the latest developments in online learning. The conference programme offered a rich choice of session formats and networking opportunities aimed at highlighting excellence, promoting dialogue and stimulating the exchange of experiences.

A total of 426 speakers from 44 countries took part in presentations, fora, workshops and seminars during the 2008 programme. The programme for 2008 was the result of extensive work throughout the year, including both an open call for proposals and a selection and invitation process supported by the event's Steering Committee, resulting in an agenda that was much appreciated by conference participants.

The conference sessions on Wednesday, December 3rd included 16 full or half-day workshops and two pre-conference fora: the 4th International Forum on Technology Assisted Learning and Training for Defence, Security and Emergency Services and the 1st ONLINE EDUCA Iberoamérica Forum. The main conference programme, which was developed through the joint efforts of the Steering and Advisory Committees, took place on Thursday, December 4th and Friday, December 5th and included 4 plenary sessions and 86 parallel sessions addressing the main themes of ONLINE EDUCA BERLIN 2008.









The Opening Plenary brought together four speakers from highly diverse backgrounds, all addressing issues concerning Learning and Culture:

- Joseph Pierre Ndiaye, Permanent Secretary representing the Ministry of Secondary Education, Regional University Centres and Universities in Senegal;
- + **Dr Michael Wesch**, a cultural anthropologist from Kansas State University, USA, exploring the impact of new media on human interaction;
- + **Prof Norbert Bolz**, Professor of Media Science at the Technical University of Berlin; and
- + Roger Larsen, Founder and President of Fronter in Norway.

During this plenary session, our keynote speakers probed the effect Information and Communications Technology (ICT) has on our usual communication norms and practices and how these norms and practices are changing with the impact of Generation Y and the ultimate effect this has on the way we learn.

Thursday afternoon's plenary session examined the topical issue of how change and uncertainty are having an impact on the way learning is managed by different types of organisations. New thinking, new expectations and new pressures all have an impact. It also explored what it means to be a member of Generation Y, to be constantly connected, globally networked and having to cope with an over-abundance of information. Keynote speakers in this session were **Clive Shepherd** from Fastrak Consulting Ltd., UK, and **Ton Zijlstra** from Interdependent Thoughts, The Netherlands.

CONFERENCE PROGRAMME















The agenda for ONLINE EDUCA BERLIN 2008 was organised around the main conference themes, which took into account the main interests and issues faced by the online learning community globally. These themes were:

Managing Director, Towards Maturity Community Interest Company, UK.

Friday, December 5th featured two parallel plenary sessions. The first addressed the topic of **Open Educational Resources** (OER) and specifically honed in on the thorny question of sustainability. Four keynote presentations were given in this session by **Dr Richard Baraniuk** from Rice University, USA, **Prof Francesc Pedró**, OECD, Centre for Educational Research and Innovation, CERI, France; **Rachel Bruce**, Programme Director-Information Environment, JISC, UK; and **Artur Dyro**, Managing Director, Young Digital Planet SA, Poland. Friday's second plenary session focussed on the impact of **Globalisation on E-Learning**. Defined as the process where enterprises and educational institutions make informed choices within a global competitive market, globalisation has come to mean far more than simply a way of doing business. Speakers in this session who examined the impact that globalisation can have on learning and training processes were **Christophe Binot**, E-Learning Manager, Total, France; **Dr Richard Straub**, ELIG - European Learning Industry Group, France; and **Laura Overton**,

CONFERENCE PROGRAMME

Particular effort was made to encourage a range of different and highly interactive formats and sessions, including learning cafés, panel discussions, debates and deliberations with a real emphasis on dialogue and exchange, which were much appreciated by conference participants. In addition to sessions built up to address the conference themes, the OEB 2008 agenda also featured an extensive range of events and activities aimed at supporting networking and future collaboration efforts amongst participants.


THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMME IN SUMMARY

Much of the discussion at ONLINE EDUCA BERLIN 2008 revolved around how the education and training community is coping with **Generation Y** as well as the **impact so-called digital natives** are having on education and training. Prof Michael Wesch, in his inspiring presentation, spoke about the disappointment expressed by many students who come to class equipped with a whole **new set of skills and expectations** only to be faced with **out-of-date learning scenarios and facilities**. In his presentation, well-known media theorist Prof Norbert Bolz argued that the labour market is increasingly evolving into a **personality market**, where **self-branding has become the norm** and where **respect for cultural diversity** is ever more important.



The **Generation Y** theme continued throughout the agenda in both presentation and discussion sessions, where presenters and participants alike discussed ways in which **change is and should be happening**. Eva de Lera from the Open University of Catalonia provided very popular **guidelines for designing engaging e-learning** aimed at meeting the needs of Generation Y students, while Charles Jennings from Thomson Reuters in the UK explained how his company **built the needs of Generation Y** into their **learning and development strategy**. Fadi Abdul Khalek from UKS in the United Arab Emirates also provided **real examples of how learning organisations are meeting this challenge**.

Another major theme turned out to be the way in which the e-learning community will be affected by the **worsening global financial crisis**, with plenty of debate as to whether this would turn out to be an opportunity or a disaster. Clive Shepherd argued that the economic downturn should be used to make **training and education far more efficient**. Highlighting a broad range of what he termed the "**forces of change**", Clive reminded everyone that it was time to take real action to make sure ICT is used as a **strong force for positive change** in teaching and learning practice. In the same session, Ton Zijlstra used his own life to illustrate **what is meant by a networked existence**. Ton made a plea against ageism, declaring himself to be a member of Generation Y, albeit in a baby-boomer's body, and argued for a shift in focus towards **a greater understanding of what it takes to live in a globalised society**.

These included different examples and studies on **how to use storytelling in learning** from presenters like Prof Grete Jamissen from Oslo University College in Norway, Dr Matthew Murray from PricewaterhouseCoopers in the USA and Andy Schaer from the University of Applied Sciences Northwestern Switzerland.

Reflecting the drive towards more use of open standards and open content, many sessions and discussion opportunities dealt with this topic. Dr Richard Baraniuk from Rice University in the USA provided considerable food for thought in his description of the Connexions Model, which he has been instrumental in developing and which provides a sustainable model for the long-term take-up of open educational resources.

Web 2.0 continued to attract attention with lots of examples about how trainers, teachers and lecturers are using innovative tools and services. These included Hank Horkoff from Praxis language Ltd. in China, who described the use of **podcasting in language teaching**, while Kjell Atle Halvorsen from the Norwegian University of Science and Technology described the use of **blogs in school leadership training**.

Gaming, too, maintained its popularity, with plenty of examples of learning games reflecting the extent to which gaming is now being taken seriously in the learning world. Adrian Hall drew on his extensive experience of promoting games in the British Department of Education and Skills to describe how he felt commercial games could be used successfully in teaching, while Natascha Blijleven-Tebbe provided a really practical and popular example of the use of gaming based on her work with the Dutch Police Academy.

Mobile learning has certainly gone mainstream. Examples shown included the use of **mobile technologies for oral examinations**, described by Gavin Cooney from the Irish company Learnosity, and **mobile learning use amongst Spanish business students**, presented by Mathew James Constantine from the IE Business School in Spain.

THE CONFERENCE PROGRAMME IN SUMMARY

The programme agenda provided plenty of practical tips and suggestions. Dr Daniel Tiong Hok Tan from Nanyang Technological University in Singapore and Lisa Gommer from the Dutch University of Twente gave advice on how best to record lectures on video and make them available online. Rather than being a simple archiving activity, both presenters explained how they were using these recordings in highly innovative formats in order to make the whole learning process far more engaging for their students. Russell Stannard from the University of Westminister in the UK also provided a practical example of working with video in language teaching.

There was a significant shift in formats this year towards far more interactive sessions involving plenty of debate and discussion. A Learning Café format proved popular when dealing with the somewhat thorny question of how to encourage more and better quality input to online content repositories, the discussion involved Dr Koos Winnips from Glasgow Caledonian University in the UK, Dr Stanley J. Portier from Stoas Learning in The Netherlands and Pascal Craeye from KlasCement in Belgium. Whereas a highly innovative Pecha Kucha format was used to engage participants in a session on choosing an LMS, which featured the input of Hendrik Drachsler from the Open University of The Netherlands and Prof Ion Roceanu from "Carol I" National Defence University in Romania.

The new demonstration location and format also proved very popular this year, allowing participants plenty of time to see new developments, services and tools in an open and inviting demonstration space. Popular demonstrations in this area included a show of materials for teaching science in school by Carlton Reeve from Illumina Digital Ltd. in the UK, tests for evaluating digital competence and e-maturity by Ingrid Radtke of Vox in Norway, and the online social community Yonders.net that aims at supporting students studying abroad, demonstrated by Peter J. Dekker from the University of Amsterdam in The Netherlands.


